Regulations

- 2010 - ECE Taskforce established with no voice for parent led services, home based services, NZEI or NZ Childcare Association
- 2011 - 100% registered teachers funding support removed and maximum number of children in childcare centres increased from 50 to 150
- 2017 - Refreshed Te Whāriki released
- 2019 - 10 Year Early Learning Action Plan released by Education Minister Chris Hipkins
- 2023 - Fair Pay Agreements, Pay Equity and Pay Parity all being negotiated.

New Strategy

- Government tertiary funding was frozen and by 2013 the organisation's earlier surpluses had dropped into deficit. Student numbers were also declining causing serious discussions in Council about the future of the business; leading to a decision for change. Three strategies emerged: an international outreach, a broader portfolio of qualifications and online teaching.
- *"The whole organisation was rejigged, every aspect of it, from student support, through to recruitment, to the technology used in teaching and the enrolment technology. It was always going to be expensive, and it was a really tough time."* Lesley Rameka, President 2016-2023

Advocacy

- Much of Te Rito Maioha's 'voice' is behind the scenes in numerous working groups, advisory boards and submissions, but we also have a voice in the media. Te Rito Maioha have organised a conference with Childspace called Ketekete mai - Make a noise for ECE and as part of the conference, we created a petition calling for 1 to 4 teacher child ratios for under 3's.
- Te Rito Maioha invited the ECE sector to speak with one voice following Budget 23. Working together the sector were able to ensure the budget proposal for 20 hours ECE for two-year-olds was workable.

He taonga te tamati - Every child a taonga: Strategic plan for early learning 2019-2029

The plan contained 23 recommendations that would deliver stronger accountability measures around licensing and monitoring and improved ratios for the under-threes. Less explicit, were recommendations around funding, teacher supply, and salaries.

Free public provision was not included but the intention to move toward to 100% qualified teachers was 'incentivised', with 'regulation' delayed. The government reintroduced the previously slashed funding band for centres with 100% qualified teachers. Implementation of the plan was to be phased across the ten years.



2017-2020 governed by Labour/NZ First

Kathy Wolfe was appointed as the new Chief Executive in 2016 and wrote in an article, *"The question has to be asked, is there a hangover here in which ECE staff are seen mainly as 'baby-sitters'? The Ministry of Education requires all primary teachers to hold a degree-level qualification, so why should it be any different for those working in the ECE sector?"*

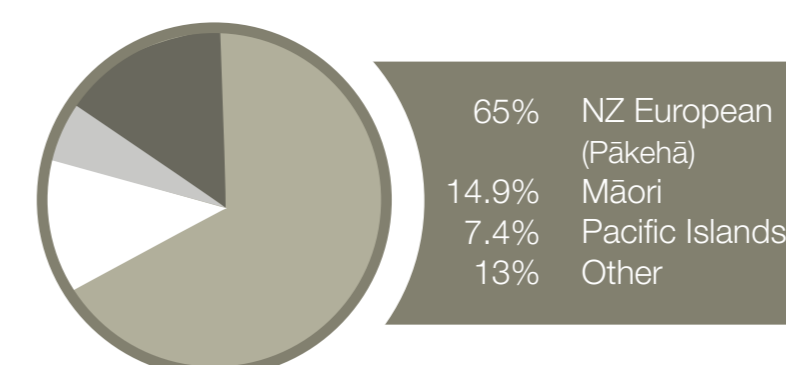

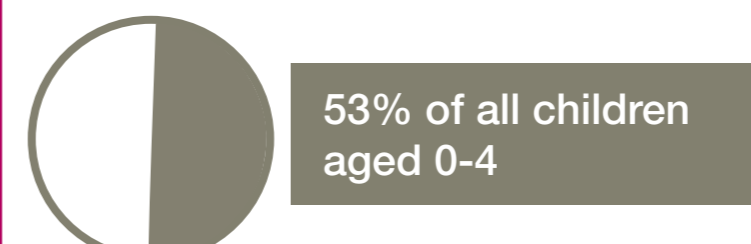
